

## 13.2 Solving Larger Systems by Gaussian Elimination

Now we want to learn how to solve systems of equations that have more than two variables. We start with the following definition.

| A system is in <u>row echelon form</u> when it has a “stair-step” pattern with leading coefficients of 1. |

Here is an example of a system that is in row echelon form.

$$\begin{aligned}x + \frac{4}{5}y - \frac{1}{5}z &= 0 \\y - \frac{3}{10}z &= \frac{11}{10} \\z &= 3\end{aligned}$$

The reason we need row echelon form, is that when a system is in row echelon form it is very easy to solve. We simply use a technique called back substituting. To do this we simply take the variables and substitute the value one at a time into the equation above it. We illustrate this technique in the following example.

Example 1:

Solve the system.

$$\begin{aligned}x + \frac{4}{5}y - \frac{1}{5}z &= 0 \\y - \frac{3}{10}z &= \frac{11}{10} \\z &= 3\end{aligned}$$

Solution:

So we need to back substitute to solve the system. Since we can see from the last equation that  $z = 3$ , we can substitute this value into the middle equation and solve for  $y$ . We get

$$\begin{aligned}y - \frac{3}{10}(3) &= \frac{11}{10} \\y - \frac{9}{10} &= \frac{11}{10} \\y &= \frac{20}{10} \\y &= 2\end{aligned}$$

Now that we have both  $y$  and  $z$ , we can substitute those values into the top equation and solve for  $x$ . We get

$$\begin{aligned}x + \frac{4}{5}(2) - \frac{1}{5}(3) &= 0 \\x + \frac{8}{5} - \frac{3}{5} &= 0 \\x + 1 &= 0 \\x &= -1\end{aligned}$$

So now we have  $x$ ,  $y$  and  $z$ . We put the solution as an ordered triple of the form  $(x, y, z)$ . So the solution to our system is  $(-1, 2, 3)$ .

So we can see that having a system in row echelon form can be a very useful thing in seeking the solution to a system of equations.

With that in mind we make the following definition.

**Definition: Equivalent systems**

Two systems are called equivalent if they have the same solution set.

So if we are able to put a system into row echelon form in a way that keeps a system equivalent, then we could easily solve the system by back substitution. Fortunately for us, we do have such a technique. We use something we call the elementary row operations.

**Elementary Row Operations**

The following operations on a system of linear equations produces an equivalent system:

1. Interchange two equations
2. Multiply one equation by a non-zero constant
3. Add a multiple of one equation to another to replace the latter equation

Using the row operations to solve a system is called solving by Gaussian Elimination.

Example 2:

Solve by Gaussian Elimination.

$$\begin{array}{ll} x - y + 2z = -4 & 2x + 6y - 4z = 8 \\ \text{a. } 3x + y - 4z = -6 & \text{b. } 3x + 10y - 7z = 12 \\ 2x + 3y - 4z = 4 & -2x - 6y + 5z = -3 \end{array}$$

Solution:

- a. To solve a system by Gaussian elimination we need to use our row operations to put the equation into row echelon form. Then we can easily back substitute and solve. Remember, row echelon form has a stair step pattern with leading coefficients of one. With this in mind, we can see that we should leave the first equation on top, since it already has leading coefficient of 1. So, we need to find a way to make the other two equations not have an x term. We use row operation 3. That is, we can multiply the top equation by -3 and add it to the second equation to get a new second equation. To simplify the matter we call the top equation  $E_1$ , the middle equation  $E_2$  and the bottom equation  $E_3$ . So, we are going to do  $-3E_1 + E_2$ . This gives

$$\begin{array}{rcl} -3(x - y + 2z) = -3(-4) & \Rightarrow & -3x + 3y - 6z = 12 \\ 3x + y - 4z = -6 & & \underline{3x + y - 4z = -6} \\ & & 4y - 10z = 6 \end{array}$$

So,  $4y - 10z = 6$  is our new  $E_2$ . So our system now looks like

$$\begin{array}{l} x - y + 2z = -4 \\ 4y - 10z = 6 \\ 2x + 3y - 4z = 4 \end{array}$$

Now we do the same thing to eliminate the x from  $E_3$ . We do  $-2E_1 + E_3$ . This will become our new  $E_3$ . We get

$$\begin{array}{rcl} -2(x - y + 2z) = -2(-4) & \Rightarrow & -2x + 2y - 4z = 8 \\ 2x + 3y - 4z = 4 & & \underline{2x + 3y - 4z = 4} \\ & & 5y - 8z = 12 \end{array}$$

So our system is now

$$x - y + 2z = -4$$

$$4y - 10z = 6$$

$$5y - 8z = 12$$

Now, remember, to get row echelon form, we need the leading coefficients to be 1. So we can multiply equation 2 by  $\frac{1}{4}$  to make the leading coefficient 1. So we write  $\frac{1}{4}E_2$  and we get

$$\frac{1}{4}(4y - 10z) = \frac{1}{4}(6) \Rightarrow y - \frac{5}{2}z = \frac{3}{2}$$

So our system is now

$$x - y + 2z = -4$$

$$y - \frac{5}{2}z = \frac{3}{2}$$

$$5y - 8z = 12$$

We almost have row echelon form. We need only get rid of the 5y in  $E_3$ . Just like we did for x, we can use the third row operation. This time we will use  $E_2$ . So we use  $-5E_2 + E_3$ . We get

$$\begin{array}{rcl} -5(y - \frac{5}{2}z) = -5(\frac{3}{2}) & \Rightarrow & -5y + \frac{25}{2}z = -\frac{15}{2} \\ 5y - 8z = 12 & & \underline{5y - 8z = 12} \\ & & \frac{9}{2}z = \frac{9}{2} \end{array}$$

This now becomes our new  $E_3$ . So our system is

$$x - y + 2z = -4$$

$$y - \frac{5}{2}z = \frac{3}{2}$$

$$\frac{9}{2}z = \frac{9}{2}$$

To finish getting it into row echelon form we simply go  $\frac{2}{9}E_3$ . We get

$$x - y + 2z = -4$$

$$y - \frac{5}{2}z = \frac{3}{2}$$

$$z = 1$$

Now we simply need to back substitute to solve. We proceed as follows.

$$y - \frac{5}{2}(1) = \frac{3}{2}$$

$$x - (4) + 2(1) = -4$$

$$y = \frac{8}{2}$$

$$x - 2 = -4$$

$$y = 4$$

$$x = -2$$

So the solution is  $(-2, 4, 1)$ .

- b. Again, we need to start by getting the system into row echelon form. We can see clearly that if we do  $E_1 + E_2$ , then we will eliminate one x value relatively easily. So we get

$$2x + 6y - 4z = 8$$

$$\underline{-2x - 6y + 5z = -3}$$

$$-z = 5$$

In fact, this operation eliminated several steps. So this will become our new  $E_3$ . We will also, go ahead and insert  $-E_3$  just to simplify the matter. Our system is now

$$2x + 6y - 4z = 8$$

$$3x + 10y - 7z = 12$$

$$z = -5$$

Now we can go  $\frac{1}{2}E_1$  to get the coefficient to be 1. We get

$$x + 3y - 2z = 4$$

$$3x + 10y - 7z = 12$$

$$z = -5$$

Clearly now we will do  $-3E_1 + E_2$  to replace  $E_2$ . We get

$$\begin{array}{rcl} -3(x + 3y - 2z) = -3(4) & & -3x - 9y + 6z = -12 \\ -3x + 10y - 7z = 12 & \Rightarrow & \underline{3x + 10y - 7z = 12} \\ & & y - z = 0 \end{array}$$

So our system becomes

$$x + 3y - 2z = 4$$

$$y - z = 0$$

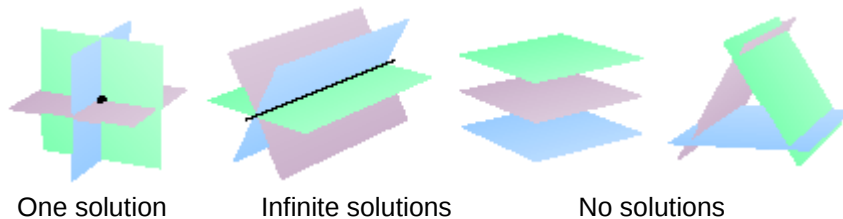
$$z = -5$$

Notice that it is already in row echelon form. Thus, we only need to back substitute to solve. We get

$$\begin{array}{rcl} y - (-5) = 0 & & x - 3(-5) - 2(-5) = 4 \\ y + 5 = 0 & & x + 15 + 10 = 4 \\ y = -5 & & x = -21 \end{array}$$

So the solution is  $(-21, -5, -5)$ .

In a similar way to systems of two variables, we have the possibility of having one solution, no solution or infinite solutions. However, this time we are dealing with one more variable. So geometrically, these types of equations are planes in three dimensions. So here we are talking about the different ways two planes can intersect. The following shows different ways that three planes can intersect.



Just like in the last section, it is usually fairly clear when we have one of these situations. We either end up with a nonsense statement (like  $0 = 3$ , for example) which means no solution, or we end up with a statement that is always true (like  $0 = 0$ ).

### Example 3:

Solve by Gaussian Elimination.

$$\begin{array}{lcl} 2x + y - z = 4 & & 2x \quad \quad + z = 1 \\ \text{a.} \quad y + 3z = 2 & & \text{b.} \quad \quad 5y - 3z = 2 \\ 3x + 2y \quad = 4 & & 6x + 20y - 9z = 11 \end{array}$$

Solution:

- a. Again we will solve by getting the system into row echelon form. Notice that we already have somewhat of a stair step pattern. So we will start by doing  $\frac{1}{2}E_1$ . We get the system

$$x + \frac{1}{2}y - \frac{1}{2}z = 2$$

$$y + 3z = 2$$

$$3x + 2y = 4$$

Now we will do  $-3E_1 + E_3$  to replace  $E_3$ . We get

$$\begin{array}{rcl} -3\left(x + \frac{1}{2}y - \frac{1}{2}z\right) = -3(2) & \Rightarrow & -3x - \frac{3}{2}y + \frac{3}{2}z = -6 \\ 3x + 2y = 4 & & \underline{3x + 2y = 4} \\ & & \frac{1}{2}y + \frac{3}{2}z = -2 \end{array}$$

So our system is

$$x + \frac{1}{2}y - \frac{1}{2}z = 2$$

$$y + 3z = 2$$

$$\frac{1}{2}y + \frac{3}{2}z = -2$$

Lets multiply  $E_3$  by 2. We get

$$x + \frac{1}{2}y - \frac{1}{2}z = 2$$

$$y + 3z = 2$$

$$y + 3z = -2$$

Now we do  $-E_2 + E_3$ . We get

$$\begin{array}{rcl} -(y + 3z) = -(2) & \Rightarrow & -y - 3z = -2 \\ y + 3z = -2 & & \underline{y + 3z = -2} \\ & & 0 = -4 \end{array}$$

Whenever we see a statement of this form we know that the system must have no solution.

- b. Again, we will start by doing  $-3E_1 + E_3$  to replace  $E_3$ . We get

$$\begin{array}{rcl} -3(2x + z) = -3(1) & \Rightarrow & -6x - 3z = -3 \\ 6x + 20y - 9z = 11 & & \underline{6x + 20y - 9z = 11} \\ & & 20y - 12z = 8 \end{array}$$

So our system is now

$$2x + z = 1$$

$$5y - 3z = 2$$

$$20y - 12z = 8$$

Notice that the last two equations are multiples. Thus lets go ahead and perform the operation  $-4E_2 + E_3$ . We get

$$\begin{array}{rcl} -4(5y - 3z) = -4(2) & \Rightarrow & -20y + 12z = -8 \\ 20y - 12z = 8 & & \underline{20y - 12z = 8} \\ & & 0 = 0 \end{array}$$

So, again, when we get a statement of this form we know that the system has infinite solutions.

Lastly, we want to see some applications of larger systems of equations. Many of the applications are similar to what we have done earlier in this text. The only difference is we can

now set them up using as many variables as needed. This, in turn can prove to streamline the entire problem. Thus the following example is an example of a problem we have not yet encountered.

#### Example 4:

Find the constants  $a$ ,  $b$ , and  $c$  so that the parabola  $y = ax^2 + bx + c$  passes through the three points  $(1, -2)$ ,  $(-1, 0)$  and  $(2, 3)$ .

Solution:

First we need to set up a system of equations. Since we know that each of the given points is on the graph, they each must satisfy the equation. Therefore, we can substitute the values of  $x$  and  $y$  into the equation for each given ordered pair. We get

For  $(1, -2)$ :

$$\begin{aligned} -2 &= a(1)^2 + b(1) + c \\ -2 &= a + b + c \end{aligned}$$

For  $(-1, 0)$ :

$$\begin{aligned} 0 &= a(-1)^2 + b(-1) + c \\ 0 &= a - b + c \end{aligned}$$

For  $(2, 3)$ :

$$\begin{aligned} 3 &= a(2)^2 + b(2) + c \\ 3 &= 4a + 2b + c \end{aligned}$$

So this is our system of equations. It has variables  $a$ ,  $b$ , and  $c$ .

$$a + b + c = -2$$

$$a - b + c = 0$$

$$4a + 2b + c = 3$$

We solve the system by Gaussian Elimination as follows.

$$\begin{array}{rclclcl} a + b + c = -2 & & a + b + c = -2 & & a + b + c = -2 & & a + b + c = -2 \\ & \xrightarrow{-E_1 + E_2} & & \xrightarrow{-4E_1 + E_3} & & \xrightarrow{-E_2 + E_3} & \\ a - b + c = 0 & \Rightarrow & -2b = 2 & \Rightarrow & -2b = 2 & \Rightarrow & -2b = 2 \\ 4a + 2b + c = 3 & & 4a + 2b + c = 3 & & -2b - 3c = 11 & & -3c = 9 \end{array}$$

$$\begin{aligned} & \xrightarrow{\frac{-1}{2}E_2 \text{ and } \frac{-1}{3}E_3} \quad a + b + c = -2 \\ & \Rightarrow \quad b = -1 \\ & \quad c = -3 \end{aligned}$$

So now we simply back substitute to solve. We get

$$\begin{aligned} a + (-1) + (-3) &= -2 \\ a - 4 &= -2 \\ a &= 2 \end{aligned}$$

So,  $a = 2$ ,  $b = -1$ , and  $c = -3$ .
